
Machali generated in a decade – 2000 to 2010

US\$101 million

• in **direct revenue** for parks, protection, local government and local businesses.

Toftigers 2010

Yet she only lives in 5% of the park



TOFTIES Sustaining the wild



So what does Machali cost to protect?

Estimated at US\$1800 per square km per annum

 Her protection costs circa US\$20,000 per annum, or US\$180,000 over the decade of her rule.

So her Return on Investment (ROI) = 50,500%

Our wake up call

Though India is ranked 6th in the world for extraordinary natural biodiversity, the same UNWTO 2017 report says India is 139th out of 140 countries for environmental sustainability in travel and tourism

Next door neighbour Sri Lanka is 15th – so lot of work to do.

The great 'wake up' call to Global Governments

Global Parks visitor revenues

is estimated at US\$650 billion per annum.

BUT Governments only invest

US\$10 billion (or a tiny 1.5%)

per annum back into protection & conservation
